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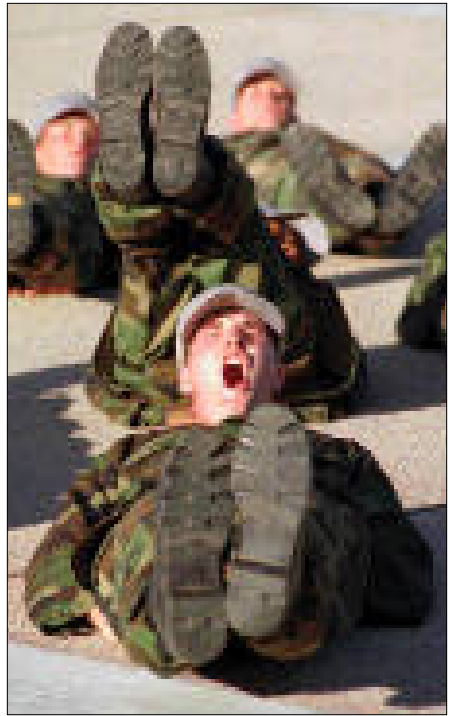

Papa's got a brand new bridge

▲ When a former Steamboat Springs resident proposed naming a new town park after godfather of soul James Brown, some townfolks laughed. But when the town built a new bridge, the longest span in the county, the name resurfaced. City officials held an election and voters overwhelmingly approved the name: The James Brown Soul Center of the Universe Bridge.

At Wednesday's dedication, the 60-year-old Brown delighted a crowd of 2,000 with his well-known phrase "I feel good, so good!" Local residents on mountain bikes with babies in carriers and golden retrievers running alongside joined fans from as far away as Denver in the fun, echoing Brown's soulful howl.

Racial graffiti was found on the bridge early in the morning, but city officials hurriedly painted over the words and the show went on. The ebullient Brown and the crowd refused to let the vandalism dampen the spirits of the day.
